

## **EASTER MESSAGE**

#### Christ is Risen. Alleluia!

Fr. Conleth and I wish everyone a very Happy Easter. We pray that the peace and blessing of the Risen Lord come upon us all and our world, especially among the Gazan people of His own land and the people in Ukraine, Myanmar. May new hope spring up, even among the debris of war, earthquake and the awful reality of human suffering and death.

As I am writing this Easter message for our Parish Newsletter, President Donal Trump's tariffs come into effect in Europe and worldwide. These tariffs will certainly pose a growing risk to Irish economy such as exports, jobs and tax receipts as businesses brace for disruption in food, pharma and tech sectors. This definitely does not sound good for the entire nation.

There's so much violence, so much greed, so much injustice, so much hurt and pain and death in our world. And the story of Easter reminds me of this. Please do not get me wrong or some people may think that I am a negative person or I thrive off doom and gloom, but the story of Easter is a reminder of how broken our world is. The story is filled with violence and greed and injustice. It's covered in hurt and pain and death and yet the story doesn't end there, it ends with Jesus risen from the dead. Death was not, and cannot be, the final story. There are other chapters to be written and to be told.

And so, the story of Easter reminds us that no matter how broken the world is, the Son of God had entered that world, endured that world, and conquered that world. He endured so that we too can endure. He persevered so that we too can persevere. He died so that we can live.

As the Risen Lord's disciples, we have a reason to be hopeful just like Jesus' disciples were struggling for hope when they experienced the cruel death of their master. Today, during this Easter season, we continue to struggle in many aspects, but there is a new sense of hope. It is like the weather has been really nice and warmer after the long challenging winter we had. Isn't that a wonderful good news. And that Easter is all about.

Therefore, this Easter, let us find within our faith the sustenance and resolve to proclaim, "He is risen." And we rejoice saying, "Alleluia. Alleluia. Moreover, Pope Francis officially declared 2025 a Year of Jubilee with a papal bull, titled "Spes Non Confundit," meaning "Hope Does Not Disappoint." Let us have hope in our Risen Lord. Through his resurrection, Jesus sends forth his disciples. Jesus also charges his followers to share the Good News of redemption, and our life in His.

As we celebrate Easter, Fr. Conleth and I would like to thank and extend a word of appreciation to our office staff Deirdre and Rita, Andy and Oliver who are working really hard behind the scene and to all who have shared their time, talent. ## **Mother McAuley Meals on Wheels Service** for older persons in Drimnagh



### Have you ever dreamed of walking the Camino



## Holy Thursday 17th April

10.00am Morning Prayer 10.30am Mass of Chrism, Pro-Cathedral



7.30pm Solemn Celebration of the Lord's Supper, *Procession to the Altar of Repose* followed by 'Watch and pray' for an hour.

On this day the Lord instituted the Priesthood and the Blessed Eucharist. His command is "Do this in memory of me." At the Last Supper he shocked his disciples by doing the job of a servant - washing their feet - and in so doing left an example of love that he invites his disciples to imitate. At the end of our Solemn celebration, with which we begin the Easter Triduum, we carry the Blessed Sacrament through the church in procession, to the Altar of Repose remembering Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane.



## Good Friday 18th April

Mass is not celebrated today.
10.00am Morning Prayer
12.00noon Children's/Family Stations of the Cross
3.00pm Solemn Celebration of the Lord's Passion
8.00pm Taize Prayer around the cross.

What a strange name for such an awful day. Today we journey with Christ on the way of the Cross, a path of suffering and of pain that leads him to the hill of Calvary and death.

How it must have broken his mother's heart to see her Son abused

and tortured, jeered at and slapped and finally nailed to a cross.

His disciples ran away, and who could blame them, they were in fear of their lives. Today we can sit at the foot of his cross and grieve for our own sins, the sins he took upon himself for our salvation.

10.00am Morning Prayer "and they laid the body of Jesus in a tomb" Today we wait in silent prayer at the resting place of Jesus.

## Easter Vigil with Baptism 9.00pm Holy Saturday

This is the night when Jesus broke the chains of death and opened the gates of life to all who believe. This is the final piece in the jigsaw of salvation history. Our readings tonight take us through that

great history celebrating the mighty deeds of the Lord in ancient times. We listen to the great promise of a Messiah, one who would change everything, and we celebrate the fulfilment of that promise in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus through Baptism.
